NOTE: Planting dates in this chart are approximate for middle Georgia. North Georgia plantings should be about two weeks later in the spring and earlier in the fall. South Georgia plantings may be made two weeks earlier in the spring and somewhat later in the fall.

*Days to maturity are from planting seed or setting transplants in the garden. The number of days will vary depending on variety (some varieties mature earlier than others), temperature and general growing conditions. Check Catalogues for individual variety maturity time.

**Varieties listed are some of the better varieties. There are many other good varieties worthy of trial.
